Hopefully we can now keep on top of the work with our traditional autumn and spring clear ups – fuelled by coffee and doughnuts! We strive for a happy middle way.

The calm pastoral setting of our church is appreciated by many people from outside the parish. We have had several groups arrange quiet days here where they have been able to meet together to both talk and to enjoy the tranquillity of the church, the churchyard and the surrounding area.

A candlelit Carol Service has always been very special to me. Not just here in Little Cornard but at school as well. When we were children Mum and Dad ran nursing stations in small First Nation communities in the far north of Canada. These places were hundreds of miles from the nearest road, never mind town.

After a while they realised that, no matter how much we enjoyed the rudimentary schools these communities had, if we were to get an education we would have to come home. So we went to boarding school in Bury St Edmunds, and had a great time there. On the last Sunday of

the Christmas term the whole school would crowd into a candlelit Bury Cathedral. Friends and parents would squeeze in at the back and a sense of anticipation would settle over us. Sunday was also the day the flight from Winnipeg landed – would they make the service or had they been delayed by snow and ice? As the organ thundered and the choirs sang the descants we would sing heartily, and then as everyone sat down we would quickly search for Mum and Dad's faces at the back of the cathedral. They never let us down and it was always an exciting start to the Christmas season.

We wish you all well at Christmas and would love to see you at the Carol Service with mince pies and mulled wine afterwards and also on Christmas morning for a special start to a special day.

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Lee Parker - Babergh District Council Report: December 2016

The world of politics continues apace as ever but this time on the international stage. Who would have envisaged the term President-elect Trump this time last year? One hopes the effects of future American foreign policy won't be acutely felt in Little Cornard but strange things are happening. Closer to home there are a couple of key pieces of news to report from Babergh.



Councillors back vital Public Access Strategy

Councillors in both Babergh and Mid Suffolk have given their backing to proposals to improve the delivery of public services from new accommodation in the county based in Ipswich. The move involves bringing both Councils under the same roof as Suffolk County Council at Endeavour House. Four options were considered including locating all services to Hadleigh, all services to Needham Market, the sharing of accommodation in Endeavour House with Suffolk County Council or a new building for the councils. The Public Access Strategy sets out the case for change with a focus on improving access and contact to modernised local services for residents and refining the way the Councils work. The Strategy also sets out the five key access channels for the local community that will be radically improved following the decision which are the fundamental service of Face to Face service being improved, changes to the telephone system that will see one main phone number, charged at a local rate, channelled through a customer contact centre, the creation and promotion of a single email address for the Councils, new Online - Digital Services and the introduction of Webchat and SMS services.

Speaking of the move, Cllr Jennie Jenkins, leader of Babergh District Council said "There is no doubt that the world of government and the public service sector is being transformed by technology, new ways of working and a challenging financial environment. Councillors have agreed that standing still is not an option. Their bold decision is the next step to ensuring services are better for residents, simpler for staff and more cost effective for tax payers." There will naturally be concerns about how those least able to access technology can continue to conduct their business with the Council. To this end there are a number of working groups actively involved in ensuring that "spokes" will be available within the District where Council services can be accessed. Suggestions so far are for an office to be set up either at Sudbury Town Hall or the library.

Appointment of New Joint Chief Executive

Both Babergh and Mid Suffolk District Councils have approved the recommendation of a cross party Joint Appointment Panel to name Arthur Charvonia as their preferred candidate for the post of Joint Chief Executive. Arthur Charvonia is currently employed as Strategic Director at Suffolk Coastal and Waveney District Councils. A qualified barrister, Mr Charvonia originally worked in London practising family, housing, licensing, criminal and immigration law. Since then, he has worked at Norfolk Constabulary, as well as the London Borough of Waltham Forest, before joining Waveney and Suffolk Coastal District Councils.

That concludes the report for December. As ever, I would be delighted to hear from you on any matters related to your District Council; please do not hesitate to get in touch. In the meantime I wish you all a very happy Christmas and New Year.

A Gardener's Question Time

On Sunday afternoon, August 21st, a group of us, comfortably seated in the Schoolroom, enjoyed the advice of Barry Gayton, the gardening expert from BBC Radio Cambridgeshire. His love of gardening started early. At the age of seven he asked for a small greenhouse for Christmas. Spending his pocket money on packets of seed from Woolworths and selling the plants he raised, he was able, by the age of 13, to spend £100 on a proper greenhouse. As he worked through the various questions we had submitted we learned much from his extensive knowledge and experience. This extended to the habits of insects as well as plants. We learnt, among other things, that elephant hawk moth caterpillars thrive on rosebay willow herb as well as fuschias and how to avoid fungal infections in pelargonium cuttings. One of his jobs was taking 20,000 every autumn and the following spring there would be almost 20,000 sturdy little plants.

Healthwatch Suffolk calls for your stories of care in the county

Healthwatch Suffolk has the power to shape, influence and improve local NHS and social care services in the county. It is independent from the NHS and social care, which means you can be honest when sharing your views.

It has launched a new campaign called "#NHSSelfieStars" for obtaining feedback from people about their use of local health and social care services. It wants to celebrate what is good about services and highlight where things could be better.

The state of the current health and care economy means that it has never been more important to share your views about local services; even if you don't think it will make a difference. The watchdog hopes that this campaign will encourage people to share their stories so that it can help health and social care professionals understand the views and experiences of people using their services and feed them into ongoing plans to change the way your services are delivered.

Healthwatch Suffolk is asking people to share a "selfie" and a story of NHS care in Suffolk so that it can highlight your experiences. All of the stories will be added to the growing volume of data the watchdog has already gathered from local people and used to hold services to account. Cornard Mere – Winter 2016



In October 2015 volunteers from the Dedham Vale/Stour Valley project, working close to the Bures Road, cut back and cleared fallen willows from this area that had dried out during the Summer. Despite water levels having risen again by January 2016, our own work parties completed the task, opening up a view across to Keddington Hill (see photo). This area has been used by wildfowl throughout the Spring and Summer with small parties of Snipe stopping off in September to feed on the exposed peat.

Earlier in the year one of three Cetti's Warblers was trapped and ringed on the edge of the reed bed, close to Little Mere, by our licensed bird ringing members. In May a lone drake Pintail spent two weeks on the main pond. On one memorable visit a female Tufted Duck was seen crossing the main pond followed by eight ducklings. With another visit from the Dedham Vale/Stour Valley team due at the end of October, Shoveler, Wigeon and Teal have already returned to feed in and around the main pond.

The team's task, this year, will be to control the spread of bulrush on the far side of the reserve while the Trust's work parties will continue to keep willows from spreading into the reed bed. Christmas is an excellent time to walk round the Mere and enjoy its scenery and wildlife; but take care along slippery public footpaths.

The large marquee provided a wonderful venue for a very social afternoon and it was great to see so many people. Clive Johnson's barbeque was delicious, as were the huge array of puds provided by the committee. Local band, Electra (led by Peter Cook, a Village Hall Trustee), gave us some wonderful music. My thanks to all those involved.

Last month's quiz raised £400, a fantastic effort from the 24 people who quizzed! As ever, Bill's questioning was diabolical and the eventual winners were a team from Long Melford, who now hold the Little Cornard Quiz trophy! I think we'll have to raise a more spirited defence of the trophy next year! Thanks to Bill, Patricia and Nigel, Carol, Karen, and Coral for their help, and for the alwaysdelicious contributions to the pudding department!

Opening your garden is an opportunity to demonstrate your creativity and skills. It is a chance to meet other people interested in gardening and can support a cause in raising funds.



Usage will be monitored by Babergh, and the locations reviewed from time to time. We have already had a request for one by All Saints Church, so can report "Bin Envy" has arrived in our village.

We are helping the Village Hall Management Committee with the status of the village hall and its legal ownership, so we can progress with the possible acquisition of some neighbouring land, to expand the car park.

The Cornard Mere is partly owned by the parish and is currently leased to the Suffolk Wildlife Trust. We would like to appeal to the parish; does anyone have any memory of this acquisition in the seventies? If you do, or have any paper work linked to it, we would greatly appreciate a look at it, or a copy. We can arrange scans - please contact any Councillor or our Clerk.



This is the Little Cornard Magazine which reports on all areas of interest in the parish. The Parish Council and the Village Hall Committee assist the Church with the finance of this magazine.

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
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
